Welcome to the Abbey, especially if you are newly with us or visiting. Use this sheet together with the main Eucharist booklet, for the hymns and readings.

Today we're using New English Hymnal: 10, 12, 299, 466

Note to **families with young children**: the children will be invited during the Vicar's welcome to go into St Benedict's for Sunday Club. They will then come back into church at the Peace. The children are then welcome to be in the play area or with you in the main seating, as you prefer.

After the bell rings the choir and clergy enter we all stand to sing Hymn 10.

We begin on page 3.

At the lighting of the Advent candle we all sing:

The holly bears a blossom The rising of the sun and the running of the deer, as white as any flow'r, and Mary bore sweet Jesus Christ the playing of the merry organ, to be our sweet saviour. sweet singing in the choir.

Page 4: we sing the **Kyries** to the St Peter's Mass setting by Rob Goodrich

Page 5: First Reading - Malachi 3: 1-4

See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the LORD of hosts. But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?

For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the LORD in righteousness. Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the LORD as in the days of old and as in former years.

This is the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

Today, instead of a Psalm, we sing the **Benedictus** – Luke 1: 68–79. The Choir will sing the response first, which we repeat, and which we then sing after each verse (sung by a solo cantor):



R Bles-sed be the Lord___ the God of Is - ra - el.

Blessed be the Lord the God of Israel, who has come to his people and set them free. He has raised up for us a mighty saviour born of the house of his servant David. **R**

Through his holy prophets God promised of old to save us from our enemies, from the hands of all that hate us, to show mercy to our ancestors, and to remember his holy covenant. **R**

This was the oath God swore to our father Abraham: to set us free from the hands of our enemies, free to worship him without fear, holy and righteous in his sight all the days of our life. **R**

And you, child, shall be called the prophet of the Most High, for you will go before the Lord to prepare his way, to give his people knowledge of salvation by the forgiveness of all their sins. **R**

In the tender compassion of our God the dawn from on high shall break upon us, to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace. **R**

Page 5: we stand for the **Gospel** reading – Luke 3: 1–6

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, during the high-priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness.

He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah, 'The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight. Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth; and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

Page 6: **Sermon** – 'The Four Last Things: Judgement'.

The **Eucharistic Prayer**, during which the bread and wine are consecrated, begins on page 9.

The choir sing the 'Holy, Holy' (p10) and 'Lamb of God' (p13) in the first performance of 'Cello Mass – Bach, Coleridge and Goodrich.

Page 14: during the distribution of **Communion** the Choir will sing 'E'en so Lord Jesus quickly come' by Paul Manz; then we all sing **Hymn 299.** (t499)

After the **Blessing** we sing **Hymn 466.**
